INTRODUCTION

The Annual Regional Analysis is a set of facts to inform community dialogue and district planning.

The purpose of the Annual Regional Analysis (ARA) is to support CPS's goal of providing every student with a high-quality education in every neighborhood by giving stakeholders a consistent array of information regarding school quality, enrollment patterns, school choice, and program offering by region. The goal is to ensure that every student in Chicago has reasonable access to quality public schools and a variety of schools and programs.

The report includes information on all CPS schools, including traditional neighborhood, selective enrollment, magnet, charter, special education specialty, and Options (alternative) schools.


This document is a common fact base from which to understand the school landscape in communities. The intent of the ARA is not to provide recommendations but rather a set of findings based on the data that serves as input to inform community dialogue and district planning.

STRUCTURE & ORGANIZATION

The ARA is organized in 16 geographic regions, aligned with Chicago Neighborhoods Now planning zones. The regions were created by the City of Chicago's Department of Planning and Development based on research on housing and jobs. They are defined with natural boundaries, such as rivers and railroads, in mind. These elements, as well as transportation options, are likely considerations for families in choosing schools. With the goal of utilizing a consistent structure year to year, these regions are more stable than city wards and school networks.


In addition to the regional structure, the ARA is organized to better understand what families and communities need in terms of school options. To best answer that question, data is provided in four areas:





KEY FINDINGS



- There are 22 schools, 9 of which are Level 1+/1, 6 are Level 2+, and 4 are Level 2 and 1 is Level 3.
- 54% of elementary students who live in the region attend a Level 1+/1 school, 61% of high school students attend a Level 1+/1 high school, and 25% of Options high school students attend a Level 1+/1 schools.
- There are 479 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats and 1,852 unfilled Level 1+/1 high school seats.
- 59% of Level 1+/1 elementary seats have no admissions criteria. Of Level 1+/1 high school seats, 31% have no admissions criteria, and 69% have admissions criteria.



- The student population in the region is 4,221, which has remained steady since the 2015-16 school year compared to the decline in the total CPS student enrollment of 7 9%
- Enrollment in schools in the region has dropped (approximately 800 students or 6.4%).
- There are 4,400 more seats than students enrolled in the region.


- 31% of students in this region attend their zoned school, 31% of students attend a non-zoned school in the region, and 38% of students attend a non-zoned school out of the region.
- 37% elementary students in the region who do not attend their zoned school travel less than one mile and 43% travel for less than 15 minutes. 34% of high school students in the region who do not attend their zoned school travel more than three miles and 13% travel for more than 45 minutes.



- The region has high density of elementary Science, Technology, Engineering & Math (STEM), elementary International Baccalaureate (IB), World Language, and Fine & Performance Arts program seats. The region does not have Personalized Learning nor Dual Language elementary programs.
- For high school students, there is high density in Early College STEM, Selective Enrollment and Military/JROTC (Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps) program seats. There are no Career & Technical Education (CTE), Fine & Performing Arts, Personalized Learning, or IB programs for high school students in the region.



MAP



The Near West Planning Area is bounded generally by Kinzie Avenue, Interstate 90, 16th Street, and Rockwell Avenue. It contains parts of five wards, 13 neighborhoods, and a single community area. It is home to 55,000 residents and is served by nine area transit stops.




DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION


The Near West Side region has become less African American and more White and Hispanic

The racial/ethnic composition of the Near West Side student population is majority African American, although in the past four years the share of African American students has dropped from 70% to 66% as the percentage of Hispanic students has risen from 11% to 12% and the percentage of White students has risen from 10% to 12%. The percentage of students qualified for Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) has dropped from 72% to 65% in the past four years. The percentage of qualified students for FRL in the region remains lower than the district average of 77%.







The majority of the students in the northwestern and southeastern parts of the Near West Side region are African American.

The Near West Side region has a mix of low-, mediumand high-income neighborhoods. The eastern part of the region is higher-income.




HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?

There are 11 elementary schools in the Near West Side region, including 3 Level 1+ schools, 3 Level 1 school, 4 Level 2+ schools, 1 Level 2 school, 1 Level 3 school, and 1 Inability to Rate school. 


There are 8 high schools in the Near West Side region; 5 of them are Level 1+/1, 1 is Level 2+ and 2 are Level 2 schools. In addition, there are 3 Options high schools, 1 of which is Level 2+, 1 is Level 2 and 1 is Inability to Rate.






HOW MANY LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS ARE THERE?





OPTIONS HIGH SCHOOL



The decline in number of seats overall from 2017-18 to 2018-19 was driven primarily by the change in how building capacity is determined (see note below). The percentage of Level 1+/1 elementary seats has increased from 31% to 44% since the 2015-16 school year. The percentage of Level 1+/1 high school seats has decreased from 81% to 79% since the 2015-16 school year. 0% of Options high school seats in the Near West Side region are Level 1+/1, which has not changed since the 2015-16 school year.



NOTE: In 2018-19, an update to the CPS space utilization standards resulted in a reduction in the number of classrooms used in the calculation of ideal capacity of a school building. Special education cluster program classrooms, Pre-K classrooms, and small-sized classrooms are no longer included in the number of seats. Seat data for Jefferson Options High School is unavailable. This school is also excluded from the seat charts. Due to rounding, some charts may not add up to 100%.




HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS?



The percentage of elementary students attending Level 1+/1 schools has increased from 48% to 54% since the 2015-16 school year. The percentage attending Level 2/3 schools has decreased from 45% to 18% in the past four years.


In the 2018-19 school year, 61% of 9th-12th grade students are attending a Level 1+/1 school, up from 52% during the 2015-16 school year. The percentage of students who attend a Level 2 school has dropped from 33% to 13% in four years.


HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS?




DO STUDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO LEVEL 1+/1 SEATS?



There are 2,731 students enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools in the region. There are 1,260 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools and 619 students enrolled in Level 2/3 schools. There are 479 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats in the region.


ADMISSION TYPE OF LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS



Of all Level 1+/1 elementary seats in the region, 41% are in schools with some admissions criteria and 59% are in schools with no admissions criteria. 76% of all 479 unfilled Level 1+/1 elementary seats are in schools with no admissions criteria.



HIGH SCHOOL



There are 5,288 students enrolled in Level 1+/1 schools in the region. There are 269 students enrolled in Level 2+ schools and 858 students enrolled in Level 2 schools. There are 1,852 unfilled Level 1+/1 high school seats in the region.

ADMISSION TYPE OF LEVEL 1+/1 SCHOOLS



Of all Level 1+/1 high school seats in the region, 69% are in schools with admissions criteria and 31% are in schools with no admissions criteria. None of the 1,852 unfilled Level 1+/1 high school seats are in schools with no admissions criteria.








HOW MANY SEATS ARE THERE FOR THE STUDENT POPULATION?


ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?



School choice is currently defined as attending a school that is not a student's zoned school. Over the past four years in this region, elementary students attending a non-zoned school (in or out of region) has decreased from 62% to 61%. In the same time frame, students attending their zoned school has increased from 38% to 39%.


SCHOOL QUALITY AND CHOICE



Of the elementary students residing in the Near West Side region, 54% attend a Level 1+/1 school. 45% of students who attend their zoned school go to a Level 1+/1 school; for students who attend a non-zoned school in the Near West Side region, that number rises to 53%; and for students who leave the region, that number is 65%.




STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY



Of the 2,985 students who attend school out of the region, most are African American and Hispanic. Both African Americans and Hispanics attend a school out of region at a higher rate than other ethnicities.

SCHOOL QUALITY OF STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY




Hispanics who attend school out of the region attend Level 1+/1 schools at a higher rate than African Americans but not at as high a rate as White or Asian students.

ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?



30% of elementary students attend a school in their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 1 or a Level 2+ school. Overall, most students attend Magnet schools or another zoned school in the region.

31% of elementary students attend a school outside of their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend a Level 1+/1 or a Level 2+ school. Overall, most students Charter/Contract schools or attend another zoned school outside the region.

61% of elementary students do not attend their zoned school. Of those students, 37% stay within one mile of their home and 23% travel more than three miles. The majority – 78% of students – travel for less than 30 minutes.





ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?


In the 2017-18 school year, CPS launched a new high school application process, GoCPS, which created a single application and timeline for all high schools. Only high school programs that require an application for admissions are included. Applicants were asked to rank the schools and programs on their application in order of preference. Students are guaranteed a seat in the general education program at their zoned/neighborhood high school and did not have to submit an application for that program. In the Near West Side region, 260 8th grade students (who were enrolled at the 20th day of school) applied to a variety of high school programs in Rounds 1 and 2 of the GoCPS application process.

Of the 8th grade students who applied in Round 1, 83% received an offer to one of their top 3 choices of high school programs. This figure does not include selective enrollment high schools.

NOTE: This analysis only includes 8th grade applicants who were enrolled on the 20th day of school in 2017-18. Due to rounding, some charts may not add up to 100%.





ARE STUDENTS CHOOSING SCHOOLS IN THEIR REGION?



Of the 909 high school students residing in the region, 61% attend a Level 1+/1 school. For students attending school out of the region, 57% attend a Level 1+/1 school; for students attending a non-zoned school in the region, that number is 77%. 0% of students attending their zoned school attend a Level 1+/1 school.





Of the 909 students who attend school out of the region (see above), most are African American. African Americans, however, attend a school out of region at a lower rate than other ethnicities, with the

exception of Asian students.


SCHOOL QUALITY BY STUDENTS WHO ATTEND SCHOOL OUT OF REGION BY ETHNICITY



African American students attend Level 1+/1 schools out of region at a lower rate than Hispanic students – 45% compared to 71%.




37% of high school students attend a school in their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend Level 1+ schools. Overall, most students attend Charter/Contract or Selective Enrollment schools in the region.

56% of high school students attend a school outside of their region that is not their zoned school. The majority of these students attend Level 1+ schools. Overall, most students attend Selective Enrollment schools outside the region.

93% of high school students do not attend their zoned school. Of those students, 34% travel more than three miles for school and 12% travel more than six miles. 65% of students who do not attend their zoned school travel for less than 30 minutes while 13% travel for more than 45 minutes.



PROGRAM DENSITY: The Program Density Index measures the "density" of certain academic programs in each region. The index is calculated as the number of program seats per 100 age-eligible CPS students who reside in the region; this index can be used to compare program availability across regions. For high school programs, this index is calculated using the number of seats available for 9th grade via the GoCPS application process and the number of 9th graders who reside in the region. 






HOW MANY PRE-KINDERGARTEN SEATS ARE THERE FOR THE STUDENT POPULATION?




